Volunteers 5 Needed! Once again its spring time and when it rolls in like a lion you can always expect rain, but foals and show season are on their way too! Here are some tips to help you get through the season.

#### Foaling Tips:

When asked for foaling tips both Dana Crager of Cross Creek Farm and Debbie Lubrano of B and B Farms both agree that you should prepare for the unexpected. "We all read the books and know what we should expect but lets face it, the mares don't read the books" says Dana. While those books can tell you the typical signs of a mare getting ready to foal, there are no sure signs. You need to be vigilant about watching your mares. It helps to know a mares foaling history, how many days does she typically

carry? When does she usually start to bag up? Knowing these things can help you pinpoint when a mare is likely to foal and also know if something is not going according to plan.



"There are so many things that can go wrong, some unpreventable, but most are easy fixes if well prepared ahead of time. "Good things to have on hand so you are prepared for anything are domperidone, to help with milk production; colostrum, vaccinations, and nolvasan to dip the foals umbilical cord. The #1 thing to have

on hand is your veterinarians phone number on speed dial!

It is also smart to educate yourself on what to do in less than ideal foaling scenarios. Back in 2001 MRLS (Mare Reproductive Loss Syndrome) hit Kentucky's foals hard which brought the "red bag" scenario to a new light. While MRLS is no longer an endemic red bag babies still occur occasionally. Be prepared and know what to do incase you are faced with this situation.

One great tip is to know normal foal behavior at hourly intervals. And watch your foal for signs of straining to defecate. Staining too hard can cause internal damage to a foal. So have enemas on hand and be ready to administer many of them! Giving Mylanta to foals can also help to ease bellyaches.

#### It Pays to Show in Kentucky!

If you thought having a KyBIF eligible horse was a good investment before, you'll like what KyBIF has to offer now!

Last year a new program was launched to help encourage owners to show their KyBIF enrolled horses in Kentucky. The new program has an estimated pay out of \$7,500 for points

earned in 2010. 2011 has an estimated payout of \$7,000! This money will be divided among points earned at Kentucky APHA shows, earned by KYBIF horses. Just like the KyBIF program, points can be earned in amateur and open classes.

## Spring has Sprung and Breeding has Begun!

Here are some great tips from breeding and foaling specialist Robin Degraff



Foaling is the time of the season we eagerly anticipate all year!

Horse breeding is a specialized activity, and there is so much to know from the basics of estrus, the actual breeding day or days, pregnancy and gestation to the particulars of producing an ideal foal by choosing the right pair of breeding animals.

The fun part is choosing the ideal mate for your mare. Paint horse breeders face challenges that breeders within other horse breeds do not have to consider. They aim to produce a horse that not only excels in conformation and performance, but that also illustrates attractive color. Make a thorough assessment of your mare's physical conformation and movement, and the qualities you are searching for. Once you've selected the 'perfect' match,

contact the stallion owner or breeding farm. Make time early in the season to obtain your breeding contract. Familiarize yourself with the terms, conditions and requirements and plan to comply as required by the farm. Filling out your information completely and returning the documentation well in advance of semen or breeding requirements. This alone helps reduce the possibility for errors.

In the case of open and maiden mares, most all stallion managers will require pre-breeding diagnostics to be provided prior to shipment of semen or breeding on farm. Once your mare is cycling normally, a negative uterine culture and cytology is imperative to obtain. This improves your chance of success on the first cycle and that by itself helps hold

down costs associated with breeding.

Once your mare is bred and has been pregnancy checked in foal. What else can you do to insure that the pregnancy is maintained? You have already invested time and money in a suitable mate and the reproduction expense to get her bred. Don't treat her like 'just another horse', she is now maintaining for two! the largest part of a foal's development within the uterus occurs within the last three months of pregnancy. Extra food, particularly protein AND minerals are required to support fetal growth during this last trimester.

"Have a green horse that used to be white? If the purple shampoo isn't getting the job done..."

#### **Show Grooming Tips:**

When you walk into the show pen you want your horse to sparkle. Here are some tips on how to get that white white:

One month to 2 weeks out from the show clip your horses white on their face and white legs, up to their knees and hocks. Be sure to use a #10 blade (not #40.) This will help get rid of the white hairs that have been stained. It also helps when it comes time to bathe, the

shorter hair will clean easier.

Have a green horse that used to be white? If the purple or blue shampoo isn't getting the job done try adding 2 ounces of alcohol to your shampoo. The alcohol is great at cutting through the dirt.

Pick up some industrial dusting cloths like Masslinn dust cloths. They are pretreated with mineral-oil so they pick up dust and hair and leave nothing but a super shine.

Just one can last all day for several horses. Remember to not use them on the white hair though, so as to not cause discoloration.

Use Pepi or other like shining spray products on hooves instead of hoof black or clear. They add shine without drying out feet. It also works great on the bottom of feet to keep dirt from sticking.

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
